The lifelong process of individuation, as Jung postulates it, unfolds continuously throughout our waking life and in dreams. In this seminar, I will explore how dreams express the continuous unconscious psychological work through the symbolic dream- language. Dreams play a significant role in Jungian analysis as pointers to the different areas of the patient's internal world as they emerge in the work. Dreams can depict changes in the dynamics within the transference and announce the potential for the activation of the transcendent function, which facilitates a movement along the path of individuation. I will illustrate some of the thinking in my presentation with clinical vignettes.

My inspiration for the title of this seminar came from the book by Dr Erik D. Goodwyn, a psychiatrist who works with his patients' dreams using Jung's model of the psyche.
